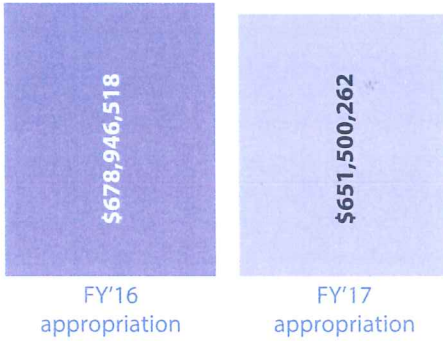

BELOW THE POVERTY LINE

626,906 Oklahomans live below the poverty line

- 56.6% are women or girls
- 35.6% are children
- 21% are living with a disability
- 37.5% are in single-female parent households
- 28.7% are in married couple households
- 25.6% are in non-family households (solo, roommates)
- 8% are seniors

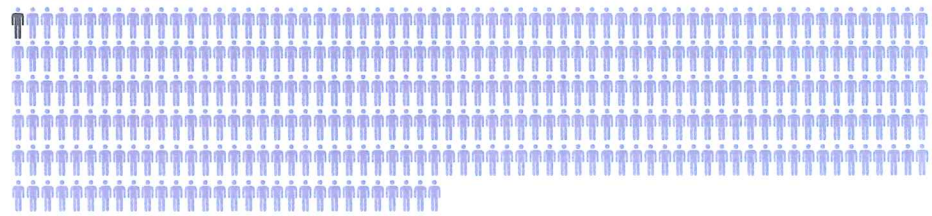
Primary Care: 1 to 64

HOMELESSNESS RATES

CHRONICALLY HOMELESS

Unaccompanied individual with a disabling condition, or a family with at least one adult or child with a disabling condition, who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more, or has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years.

Of the 214 chronically homeless individuals in 2015, 34% were staying in an unsheltered environment.

VETERANS

A person who has served on active duty in the Armed Forces

Approximately 10% of Oklahoma City
20% of homeless veterans in Oklahoma City were unsheltered

9% of homeless veterans were identified as female

FAMILIES

Household living with at least one child under the age of 18
18% of Oklahoma City

SPECIAL NEEDS

A person living in an emergency shelter, transitional housing, or a place not intended for human habitation who has one or more disabling conditions:

- As of 2015
- Severe mental illness – 38%
- Substance abuse – 46%
- HIV / AIDS – 3%
- Domestic violence – 16%
- Unaccompanied minors – 2%

CONTRIBUTING TO HIGH MORTALITY RATES ARE BEHAVIORAL RISK FACTORS THAT DISPROPORTIONATELY OVERBURDEN OKLAHOMANS. AREAS OF CONCERN INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:



Oklahoma has the next to lowest rate of fruit consumption in the nation.



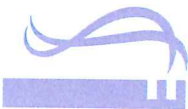
Oklahoma has the 44th lowest rate of vegetable consumption in the nation.



Oklahoma is the 44th least physically active state in the nation.



Oklahoma has the sixth highest rate of obesity in the nation.



Oklahoma's adult smoking rate in 2012 was 23.3% compared to 19.6% nationally.

Oklahoma has the **HIGHEST** RATE OF DEATH DUE TO CHRONIC LOWER RESPIRATORY DISEASE IN THE NATION.

Oklahoma has the **THIRD** HIGHEST RATE OF DEATH DUE TO HEART DISEASE IN THE NATION.

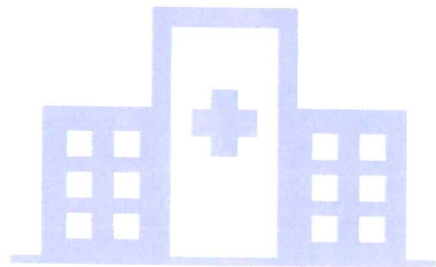
Oklahoma has the **FOURTH** HIGHEST RATE OF DEATH DUE TO STROKE IN THE NATION.

Oklahoma has the **FOURTH** HIGHEST RATE OF DEATH DUE TO DIABETES IN THE NATION.

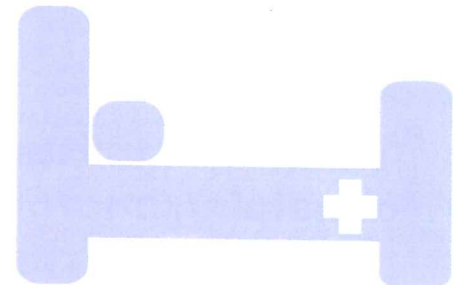
Oklahoma has the **12TH** HIGHEST RATE OF DEATH DUE TO CANCER IN THE NATION.

Number of hospitals in the state: **157**

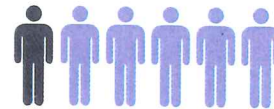


Number of staffed beds in the state: **10,992**

HEALTH INSURANCE

Oklahoma ranks 7th highest in the nation for its percent of uninsured citizens.

More than one in six (666,000) Oklahomans are uninsured, 17% of our citizens.



One in 10 Oklahoma children (98,000) is uninsured, 9.8%.



Oklahoma ranks 15th in the nation for percent of uninsured children.

Oklahoma hospitals provide more than \$560 million in uncompensated care annually.
